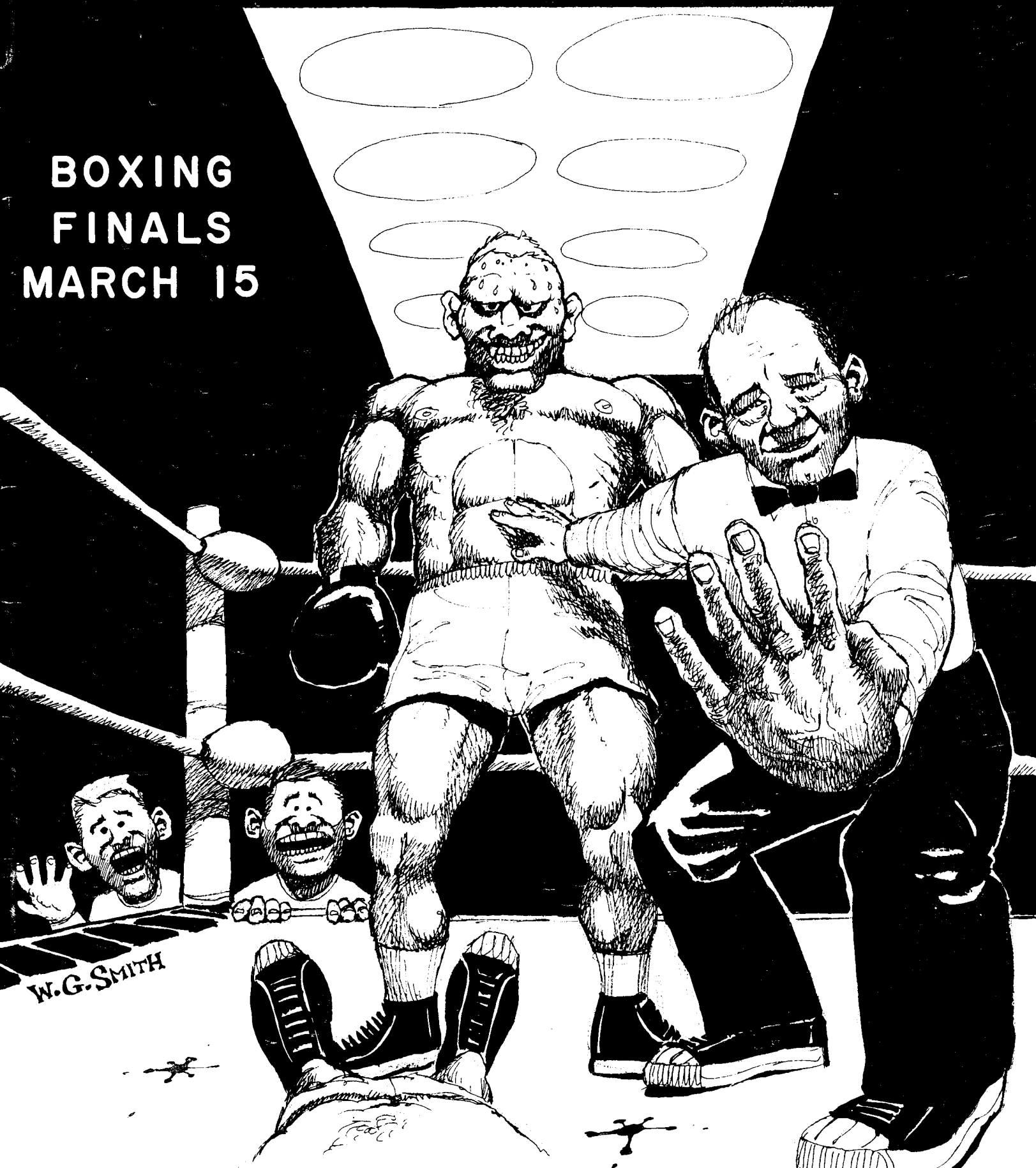

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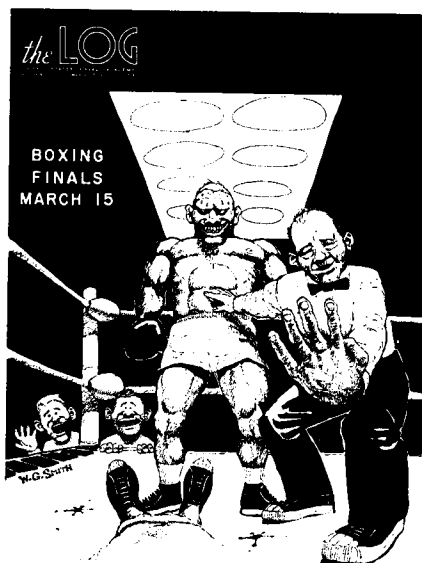
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This years boxing finals should prove exciting.

# EDITORIAL PAGE

At the beginning of this school year I was told by one of my seniors, who was still my officer representative at the time, that Logs from the previous several years had been typified by a gradual decline in quality, color, and interesting contributions from within the Brigade. He also ventured that the best way to judge how well the staff did their job was to see how many Logs were thrown out in the trash the morning after distribution. This being one of our few points of agreement I have recorded it for whatever value the reader may appraise. I might also point out that if his assumption was valid then the staff must be doing an acceptable job in the eyes of the Brigade, for although I do not conscientiously observe the contents of the morning trash, I have noticed fewer Logs being thrown out this year than any other while I have attended the Academy.

I don't want to give the impression, however, that I am waving a banner over my staff for while the Brigade has responded most favorably to our efforts, selected outside readers have on occasion raised various objections. We accept this criticism and realize that through this magazine we have responsibility which reaches far beyond Bancroft Hall. Perhaps we have either been unaware of this responsibility or have unconsciously ignored it in our attempts to provide a means for creative thought and expression. At any rate, outside criticism became severe following the Christmas issue. It has been relayed to the Brigade that one government official stated that to find out what is happening at Annapolis all he has to do is read the magazine of the Academy. This statement deserves very little comment except that if it is true, then quite probably one could also find out what is happening here by reading Academy Regulations. Neither, in its own extreme, reflects the big picture.

It seems that due to an unfortunate error in timing, the Log has been associated with the present chapel case, as a bit of satire concerning church and religion appeared in this magazine about the same time as this case went to court. Those who cannot recognize satire or refuse to consider it as such, or need a scapegoat for the initiation of the lawsuit, are invited to cancel their subscriptions. We force no one to read this magazine and will refund the remainder of any subscription left unfulfilled by a cancellation at this time.

Those who associate this magazine with the chapel case, or seem to do so by continually referring to both in the same breath, are invited to read the last issue to gain some bit of understanding as to what position the Log established. Our statement was made editorially in more than one article and needs not be clarified any further. However, it might be interesting for some to know that correspondence from the ACLU was rejected for publication and the Log made it clear that it would not provide any address or location where

midshipmen could sign up to have their names entered as plaintiffs in the case. I don't know what more this magazine could do to support the policy of the Administration in this area and yet in the past two weeks many references both direct and indirect have associated the Log with this very case. If this was not the intent than it should be so stated; if it was the intent then it is nothing less than a malicious and misguided attempt to defame the magazine and pass it off as the nucleus of the "small minority" within the Brigade who are responsible for all the recent bad publicity.

And now, while speaking of bad publicity, I think it necessary to mention some of the recent attempts to bad mouth the Academy which many readers have observed in some of this country's leading newspapers. A recent issue of the Washington Post stated that, "first class midshipmen have almost every weekend off and underclass have two weekends a month." Also, it was stated that midshipmen keep their wigs in the same place as their girls and liquor. This scatter-shot is an obvious attempt to discredit the Academy and is merely another example of the muck-raking to which we have become accustomed. No one is more aware of this than a member of a losing athletic team who can usually find an extended account of his so called hapless performance, in the paper the day following a narrow defeat. Sensationalism has always sold newspapers but a little truth now and then might improve the image of a paper which finds a large distribution center within the walls of the Academy. DAE

The weekend will begin tomorrow at 1100 and will continue through Sunday afternoon until 1600. All midshipmen are invited to talk with these fine young men and to attend the Saturday evening session in Michelson Hall at 1930 which will feature Don Shinnick, Bobby Mitchell, John Mackey, Tom Matte, Gilbert Reynolds and several Navy athletes telling about their personal relationship in Christianity.

## EDITORIAL

It has come to my attention through the grapevine that recently the Trident Magazine printed a letter of which a good deal had formerly appeared in the *Log*. The *Log* Staff considers this to be a low and underhanded publicity grab by Trident, and the belated attempt by its editor to clear himself of an "attack" on the *Log* is actually nothing less than an admission of guilt on that very charge. I would also like to point out the *Log* staff is made up entirely from members of the Brigade. While we have accepted letters and press releases from outside sources, and are soon to publish an issue consisting of contributions from interested ladies, we have never found it necessary to procure staff members from the outside, especially to fill positions as high as a department editor. My intent is not to castigate Trident for following such a course of action. However I cannot condone this act in that the readers are not informed of it. If my statements take on the appearance of an attack on the Trident, then it is quite possible that the reader is familiar with that magazine. A challenge was forwarded and it has been answered; nothing else needs to be said.

Discredit has been brought upon the *Log* from many sources in the past few weeks and I feel that some of it has been quite severe and correspondingly unjust. I assume that most readers know of the law suit now in court concerning the Academy chapel policy. I have already made a statement on this issue and will not pursue it further.

Other statements have been made recently which single out the *Log* as a source of dissent within the Brigade. This is in no way surprising and is considered by the staff to be a compliment in that the *Log* has become a means by which midshipmen can express their opinions. A young officer who is unable to express his opinions, or even worse, one who does not even possess opinions, due to his existence within the cloud of bureaucratic rigidity which typifies today's military structure, will certainly not make the best division officer, company commander, nuclear submarine captain or fighter pilot. All of these positions must be filled by men who can interpret instructions and still make personal decisions and judgments based on their instantaneous situation. No set of regulations can provide directives for each and every situation, and

when an officer encounters something for which no directive has been provided, or his existing directive appears outdated or undependable it is to his benefit to be able to question and consider various courses of action. I think that Pueblo incident typifies what can happen when military men at all levels become too dependent on existing rules, limitations and policy; a demonstration of the unwillingness to make a decision with which a senior might disagree, even if it is right.

If the *Log* has provided a means for the Brigade to ask questions and try to raise answers, if it has allowed men to be creative, if it has aroused the interest of its readers, then we of the staff have succeeded. Some of you appear to need a scapegoat, something to pin the blame on for problems which have arisen within the Brigade; but the problems were here before my staff took over, and many will remain long after we have gone. Judging by the support from members of the Brigade I can't help but feel we are getting through to them. We will continue our efforts, accepting criticism and compliment alike, attempt to satisfy all of our readers, and realizing the impossibility of this task, look forward to graduation.

After almost four years of failure, I have finally remembered what it is that life at Navy reminds me of. If you are familiar with the writings of Antonin Artaud, the French poet and visionary, then you know what is meant by "theater of the absurd." Even if you aren't acquainted with Artaud, a couple of years within the confines of Mother Bastille is sufficient experience for a working knowledge of the term. My gratitude is hereby expressed to whatever power it was that decreed that '70 was finally in double figures. I feel the urge to do more important things with my life than play guinea pig for the whims and experiments of people who know it all because they spent four years here many moons ago. We have all been told countless times that new programs are being instituted for the purpose of developing our perceptive abilities and intellectual capacities. From my experience I can only say that it's about time someone realized that such development might be useful to a Naval Officer.

I can't believe that a government official in Washington, D.C., was so unaware as to think that anything he wanted to know about what was happening at the Naval Academy could be found in the *Log*, a publication which is, above all else (at least this year), a humor and satire forum. I don't profess to know the reason for it, but there always seems to be someone who can't recognize satire for what it is, who believes exactly what he reads, and

creates no end of trouble on the basis of his own misinterpretation. I hate to even consider the consequences if someone published something like "A Modest Proposal to End the Vietnam Conflict." Problems would be diminished in a great many areas if people would delve into them a little deeper than skin level. I do not doubt for a moment that I am growing older as I stand in my place listening for the shibboleth that will allow me to pass to salvation. 'Eternity exists in an atom of duration'. Never before has this phrase seemed to hold more truth. I revolt at this waste of my precious time.

"Perhaps one would say that I am practicing contumacy merely for its own sake; a Sisyphus of petty things. This could be true, but how is one expected to react to such a vacuous, phlegmatic existence? Should I be standing proudly erect as if knowingly awaiting my own Armageddon?

"Well, my question goes unanswered. The end of eternity draws near and I hear the sigh of my salvation. At last, relief from uselessness.

"The prophet speaks, Brigade seats."

The next story is a page out of the old Navy, but I still think it is well worth printing. The writer is Rear Admiral P. D. Gallery, USN (Ret):

"As a former managing Editor of the *Log*. I thought you might be interested in a little yarn about the Academy. I was reminded of it at a '28 Class lunch recently:

## FINALISTS NAMED:

# MILITARY WIFE OF THE YEAR

EDITOR'S NOTE: The LOG is pleased to be able to print the following story and pictures as received from Harrell International, Inc. The staff wonders, however, how a Wife of the Year could be picked from a group which does not include Mrs. Calvert, or another wife from the Academy family.

WESTPORT, Conn., March 2—Five military wives from all branches of the service were named as finalists for the 4th annual Military Wife of the Year awards, it was announced today by Harrell International, Inc., the program's producer.

The naming of the five finalists who have contributed the most to their military and civilian communities ends a yearly search from among the 1,400,000 military wives at bases all over the world. This year each service conducted its own contest to select its representative who will compete for the 1970 Military Wife of the Year title.

The five finalists, with 32 children among them, are Mrs. Anne M. Greer, wife of Marine Gunnery Sergeant Richard L. Greer of Camp Lejeune, North Carolina; Mrs. Laure Weymouth, wife of Rear Admiral Ralph Weymouth of the U.S. Naval station in Norfolk, Va.; Mrs. Gussie Sanford, who is with her husband, Army Lieut. Colonel Albert Sanford in Frankfurt, Germany; Mrs. Anselma Beckwith, wife of Commander Stuart S. Beckwith who is in the Coast Guard in Seattle, Washington; and Mrs. Bonnie-Jane Luft of Fairborn, Ohio, whose husband Major Neale M. Luft is in the Air Force at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

Mrs. Greer, whose husband is an instructor at the Motor Transport School at Camp Lejeune, is a former Marine herself. A native of Auburn, New York, and the mother of 4 children, Mrs. Greer has devoted her life to the welfare of others. Her nomination as a finalist came because of the outstanding work she is doing in enriching the lives of the underprivileged and culturally deprived girls in her sec-

tion of North Carolina.

She stated: "I do not have any titles, I just have work to do. We must work closely within the military and civilian communities. We must be able to turn to each others' families and our community in time of need."

Mrs. Greer founded a Girl's Club for those children, raised the funds to sustain it and enlisted the aid of other military wives. This association led to work with the Girl Scouts, which involved various capacities to improve the girls' physical, social, civic and cultural backgrounds. She felt she had the qualified leadership and support of the community and a personal obligation to assume the responsibility to help these young girls, most of whom were from families that existed on welfare payments. These girls now have an opportunity they may otherwise have been denied.

The many contributions to the communities where Laure Weymouth has lived with her Navy husband earned her the nomination to the Military Wife of the Year award over 19 other Navy finalists.

Born in France and married to a native of Seattle, Mrs. Weymouth's major interest has always been the welfare of the enlisted wives in her husband's commands from Iceland to Hawaii. But she also became involved with civilians in notable ways.

One of her outstanding achievements was when Admiral Weymouth took command of the Iceland Defense Force several years ago. Mrs. Weymouth is credited with helping to enhance the confidence of the Icelandic people in their American friends. So successful was she that just a year ago when the Weymouths returned to

Keflavik, Iceland for an unofficial visit, the Icelanders not only turned out en masse to welcome them, but so did the President of Iceland, his Prime Minister and Defense Minister.

Mrs. Weymouth, mother of 8 children, is not only a linguistic expert often used as an official interpreter, but was at one time the world's eighth ranking woman skier. She is the only woman member of the Alpine Hiking Club whose main pursuit is climbing mountains on skis.

Mrs. Gussie Sanford of Frankfurt, Germany, was one of 9 finalists whose husbands are Army men. A former teacher with a Bachelor of Science degree from Illinois State University and mother of 5 children, Mrs. Sanford did much to foster an informal person-to-person diplomacy among her German neighbors and improve the image of Americans abroad.

Mrs. Sanford is a leading member of Steuben-Schurz Gesellschaft, a German-American society, and an honorary member of Haus der Volksarbeit, a German Catholic women's organization in Frankfurt. She is also President of Military Council of Catholic Women, an international organization involved in all phases of human life in the civilian community as well as the military.

Mrs. Josephine Polk, wife of the Commander in Chief, U.S. Army Europe and Seventh Army, in a letter endorsing Mrs. Sanford's selection as Europe's nominee, sums up the comments of other endorsements by writing, "This woman has a tremendous capacity for giving."

Finalist Anselma Beckwith, mother of seven and a native New Yorker, has become in just four years more involved in Seattle

civic affairs than have most of the natives of that city in their lifetimes, according to the judges of the Coast Guard competition.

She was co-founder of CURE (Christians United for Racial Equality), head of her community's Human Rights Council and has done a remarkable job in persuading churches, schools and community organizations to better the racial climate in Seattle. The programs she and her group have organized have had notable success.

One of Mrs. Beckwith's biggest accomplishments was providing homes for black college students. For her efforts in making life a little better for all, Mrs. Beckwith was given the Community Brotherhood award this past year, sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Bonnie-Jane Luft, the Air Force representative, is also one of those astonishing women who can successfully rear a family of eight and still find time to involve herself in many community activities.

In less than two years at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Mrs. Luft became known as the woman who would never turn down a request for help. She was chosen Volunteer of the Year last year for her work with the Air Force Family Services program, with 1,500 volunteer hours to her credit.

She is also an advisor to church youth groups, a member of the Project Commitment program for Fairborn, Ohio, and is actively involved in finding housing for blacks in her local area.

Mrs. Luft works with vacation bible schools, Girl Scouts, helps her

husband with his Cub Scout pack, and works with the Family Services' Welcoming, Emergency, Hospital, Publicity, and Overseas Wives Groups Committees. An accomplished singer, she entertains on and off base, at mental hospitals, old folks homes and orphanages.

One of these five women will be chosen Military Wife of the Year 1970 by a distinguished panel of judges selected by the General Federation of Women's Clubs. The winner will be announced in Washington, D. C. on May 26th at the annual awards ceremony banquet at the Shoreham Hotel. The name of a high ranking government official who will present the award will be announced shortly.

# PROFESSOR GILLEY

Ever wonder just who the gentleman is that hides behind the large Chapel organ and accompanies the Protestant and Antiphonal choirs on Sunday mornings? He is Professor Donald Gilley, and to him belong the hands which produce the mellow tones that echo through the Chapel and comfort the church-goer on the morning of the Sabbath. As well as being a talented organist, he is also the Chapel Music Director and responsible for the fine choirs heard at Protestant chapel.

Prof. Gilley came to the Academy on January 10, 1944 to replace Mr. Crosley, organist and Musical Director at that time. He came highly recommended from Worcester, Massachusetts, where he had been organist in Wesley Church. During his career at the Academy chapel, he has taken choirs to the White House twice, to the Hollywood Bowl, and on several occasions to Saint Patrick's Cathedral for massing of colors. Through his post he has met such noted celebrities as Ed Sullivan and Pat Boone, appearing on their television shows; Burl Ives, President Nixon, and the Queen Mother of England, as well as several heads of state and Naval dignitaries.

When he first came to the Academy, only the Protestant choir was singing under his direction. In 1948, under Admiral Peers, he established the Antiphonal choir and the Glee Club. In later years, the work of directing three choirs became too great, and he gave up the Glee Club, which along with the Catholic choir is now directed by Mr. McEwan, who plays the organ at Catholic Chapel.

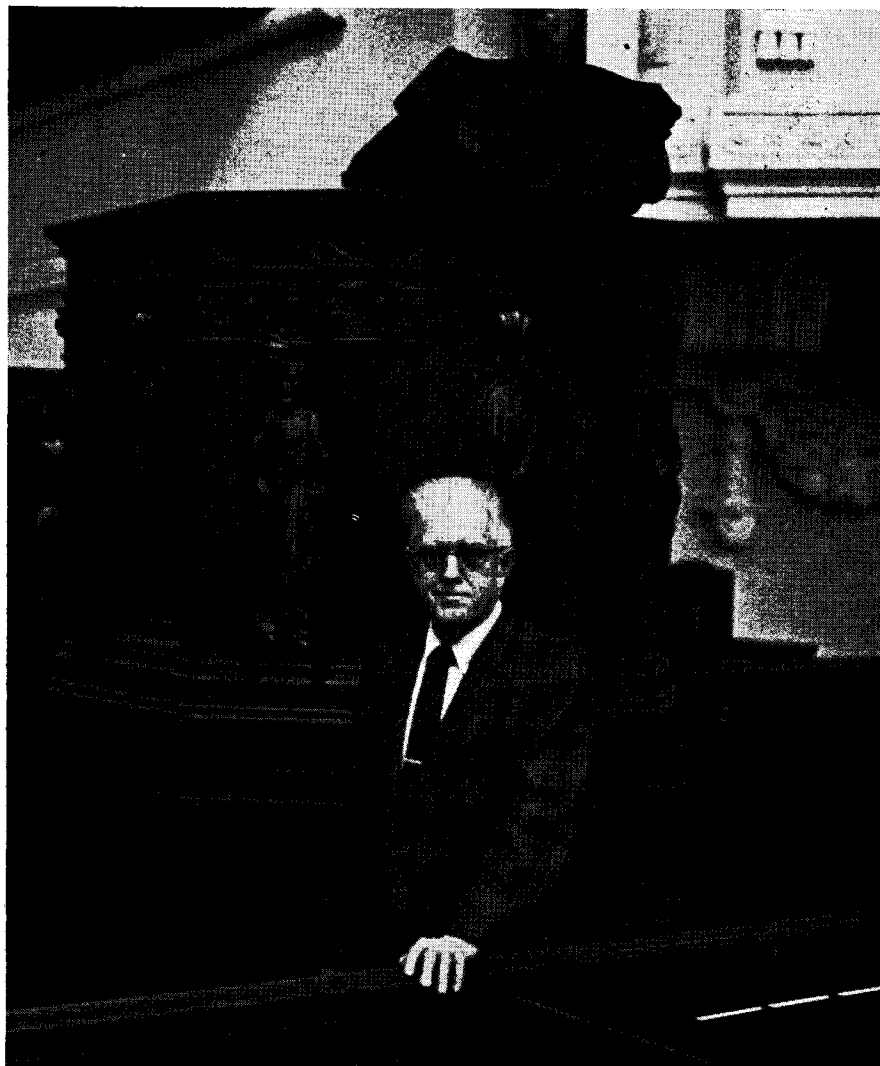
Hailing from Stoughton, Wisconsin, Professor Gilley studied organ in high school under the direction of Miss Vinnie Hegge, who, he says, had the greatest influence on his decision to make a career as an organist. His small hands could not stand up to the strain of playing the piano, so he studied Music at Beloit for two years and went on to Oberlin Conservatory, where he majored in organ while minoring in

piano. He practiced four hours a day, as well as studying Theory and History. He received his Bachelor's degree in Music from Oberlin, and went on to the University of Cincinnati, where he received a Master's degree in Music.

Although he puts in seven days a week at the Chapel, between choirs on weekday mornings, Chapel services on Sunday morning, as well as weddings and funerals during the week, he finds time to get in a little fishing now and then. He is an avid sports fan and particularly likes cars. Professor and Mrs. Gilley, who is an attorney with the Social Security office in Baltimore, live at Pendennis Mount.

Prof Gilley has nothing but praise for the Midshipmen he knows and has known. He has enjoyed working with them over the years, and he particularly enjoys being present when one of "my boys" gets married or returns to the Academy as Chapel Officer.

A man of strong convictions, Professor Gilley feels that the Chaplains have done a very good job of "developing Midshipmen morally", and that nothing should be done to impede the fine work which they do, which is something which should be given a little thought the next time organ music resounds through the Chapel on Sunday morning.

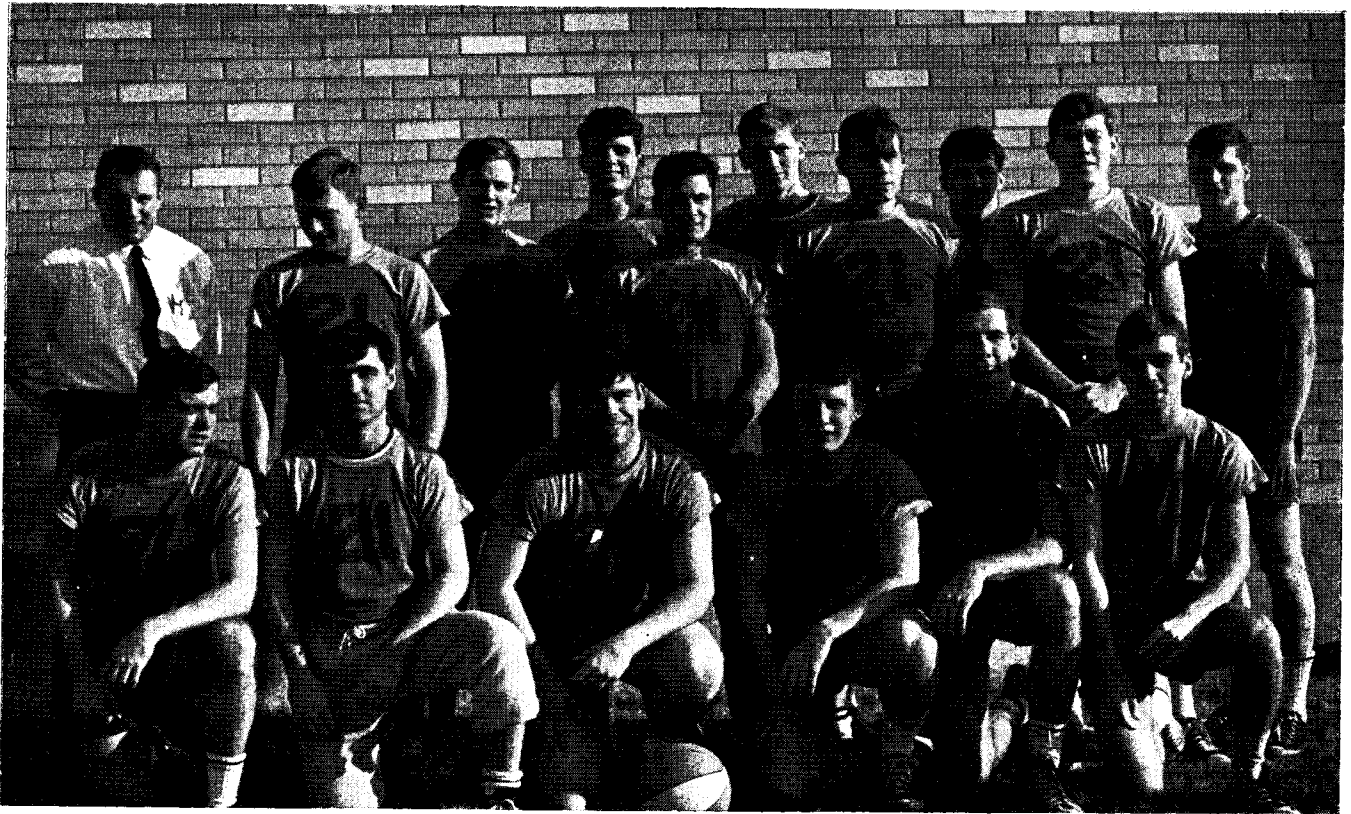

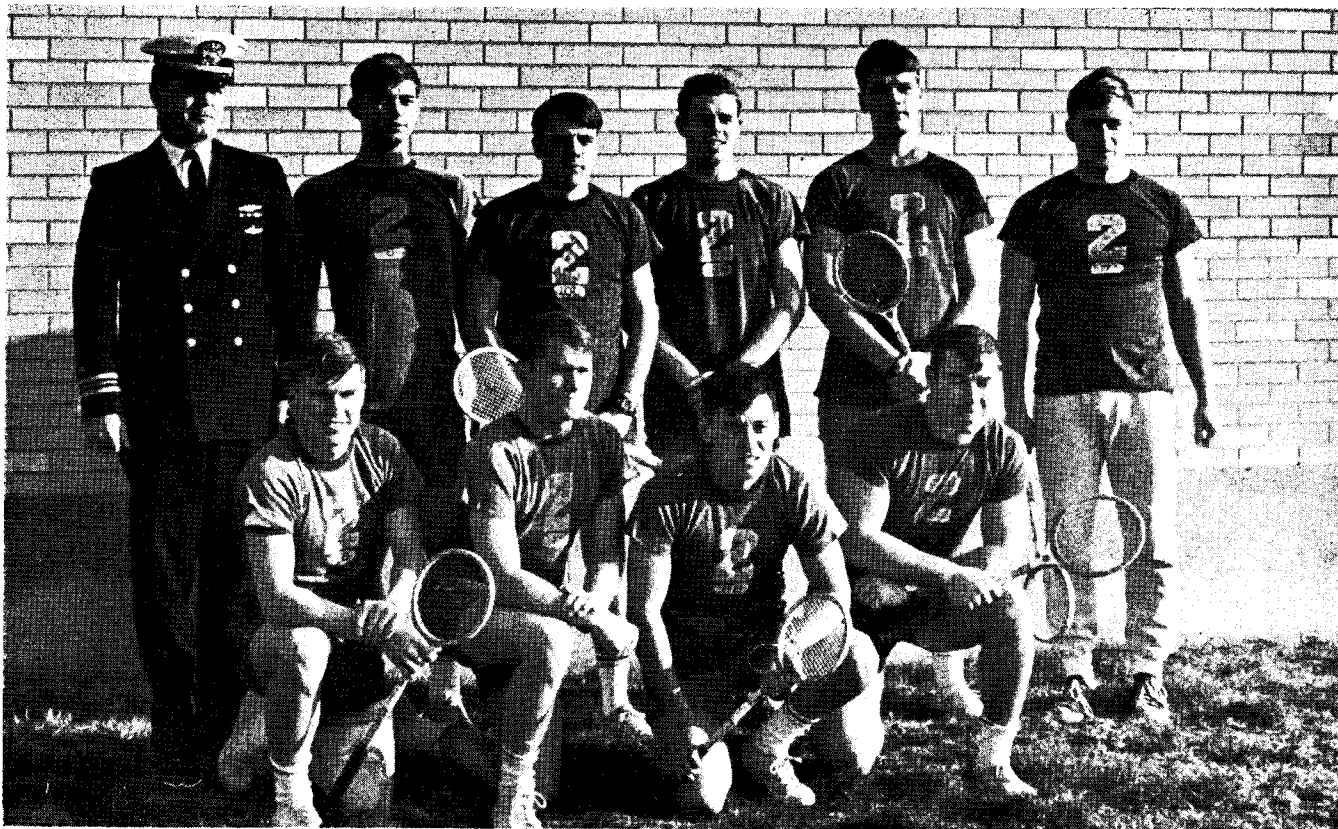

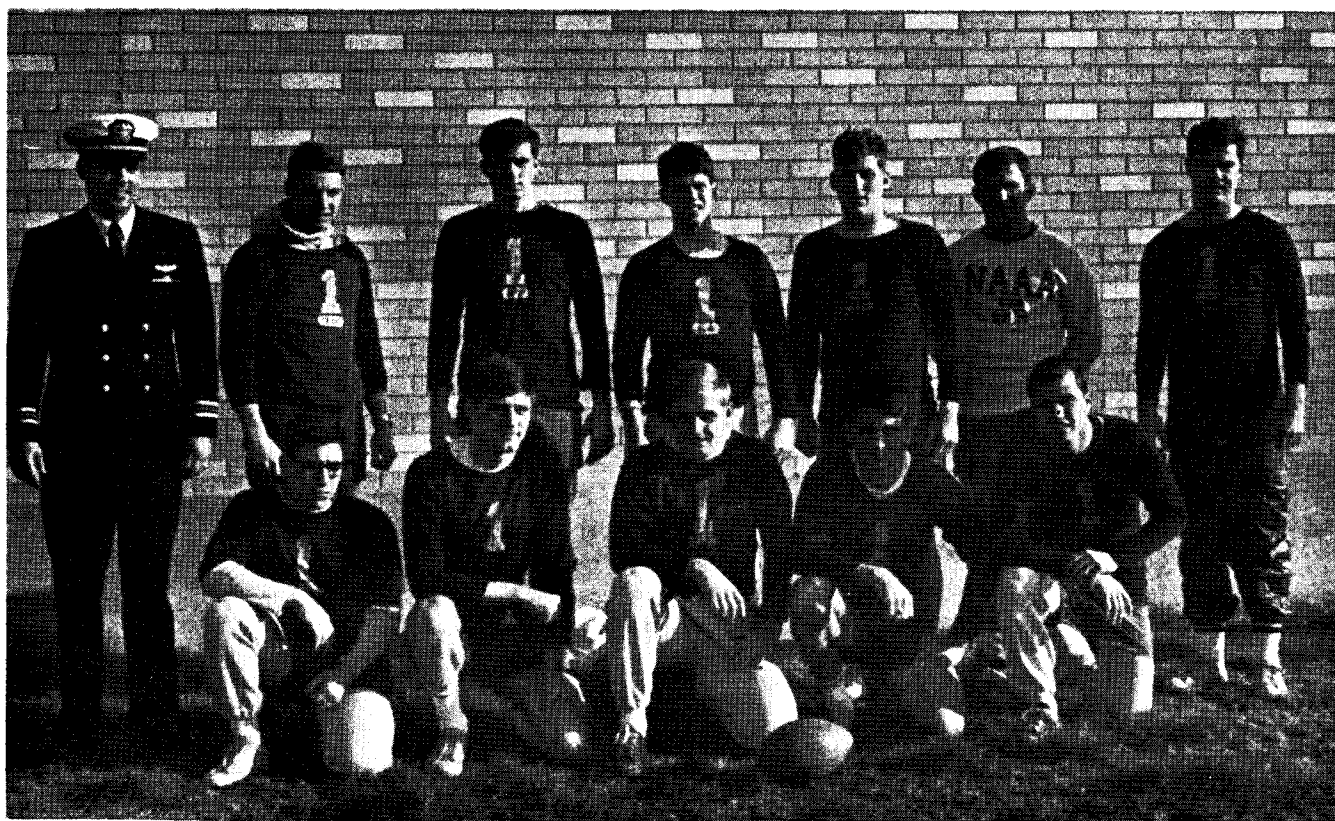

A quick survey of the opposition shows that this season will be very interesting, and could develop into another Army-Navy national championship game.

The first college game on our regular schedule this year will be Harvard. Harvard has been improving their lacrosse program quite rapidly in the past several years, and should be a strong team this year. They are led by All-American Bruce Regan, who plays attack and midfield.

Mount Washington should be a powerhouse this year, after a very unsuccessful campaign last year. The big cause of this improvement was the graduation of the class of '69 from Johns Hopkins, which donated three All-Americans to the Mounts, namely Bob Cowan, one of the finest attack men in the country at Hopkins, Phil Buck, and Charlie Goddell.

Princeton will have a fair team this year, but in the author's opinion, will not stand a chance on Ingram Field, Saturday 11 April, against the vengeful onslaught of the Navy team. The middies remember all too well the 10-8 fluke upset last year by Princeton which cost Navy the national title. One of their top players will be the younger brother of a former ('63) Navy player named Hendricks.

Maryland will be considerably stronger this year, after a poor season last year. The biggest factor in their improvement could prove to be their acquisition of a new coach, Coach Beerdmore, who comes from the coaching job at Virginia. Last year coach Beerdmore was able to get a lot out of very little talent at Virginia, and gave Navy a very tough game, losing to us 7-6 with a Navy goal in the last minutes of the game. At Maryland he should have much more talent to work with, and the fact that he was an All-American himself there in 1963 should help. Virginia lost not only their coach, but a first string All-American goalie, and most of their midfield, but should still have a fairly good team this year with a strong attack.

Hopkins lost their two best attack men and all of their defense. The loss of three All-Americans, should have its effects on the Blue-Jays, but they can not be counted out of contention, as they usually manage to field an excellent team. Their top player returning will be Charlie Coker, who made first team All-American last year.

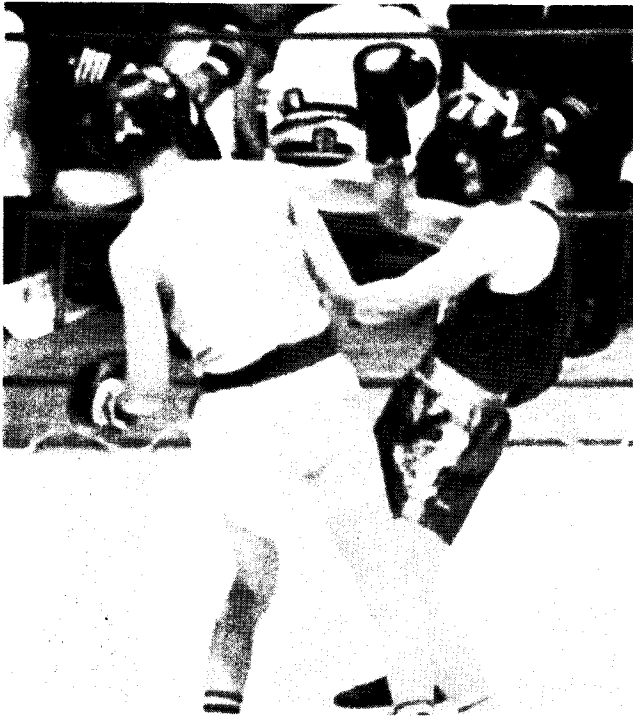
Washington, who lost All-American Ron Regan, and Baltimore should not be very strong this year, and not much is known about the Philadelphia Lacrosse Club.

If Navy is able to go through the season without losing up to the Army game, the setting should be the same as last year, with the national championship riding on the Army-Navy game.

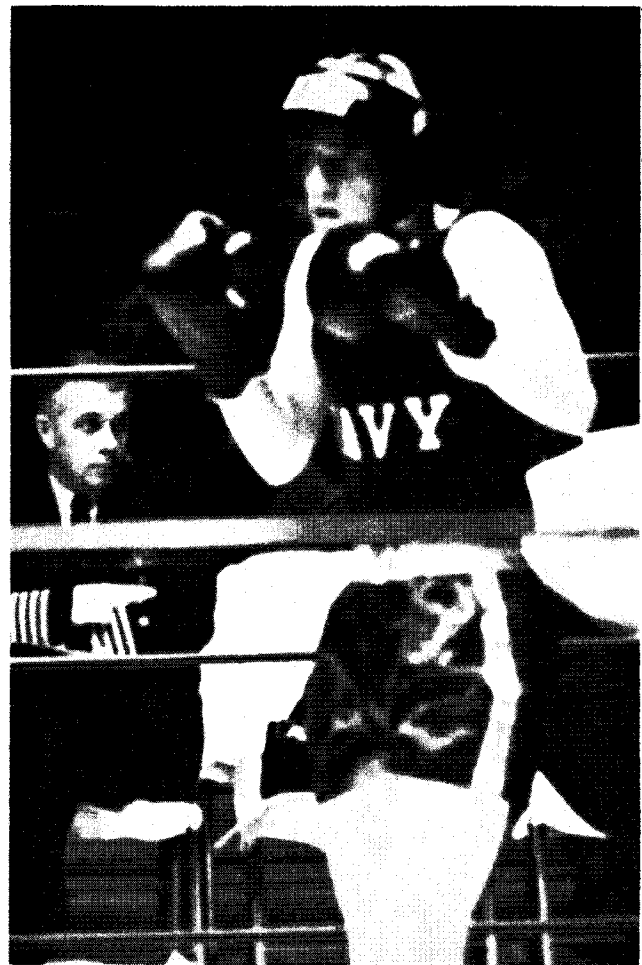

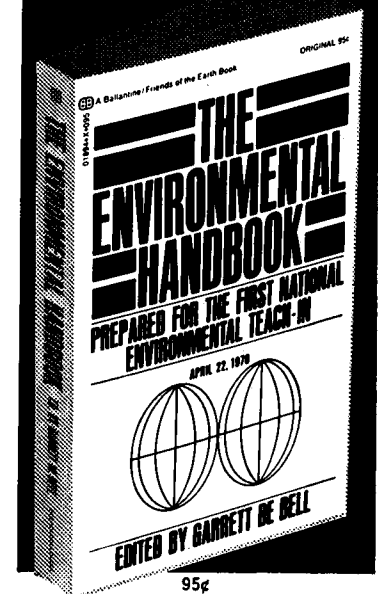
## The LOG
