

(The last clue to my identity is that I've been on a brigade champion team every year at this fine old place.)







rugby . . . because

It was fall of 1823 and two arch college rivals north of London, England, were gallantly striving for the big soccer win. As the ball was passed to one of the more incompetent players he became disgusted with his feeble attempts at foot control so he scooped the ball up, tucked it away and streaked for history's first recorded touchdown (and most controversial). The player's name was William Ellis and his college, Rugby School. Thus is the derivation of the name and the game.

It wasn't until May 15, 1879, that the first time intercollegiate rugby game was played in North America. At that time the only two teams were University of Montreal and Harvard and that spring day found them battling to a 0-0 tie. Now a hundred years later there are a couple hundred teams sprinkled across the country, the largest concentrations being along the Eastern Seaboard and San Francisco Bay area.

What drives a man to play Rugby? Is it the close physical contact and sense of community found in the scrum? Could it be the coy game of "footsie" played between opposing front rows or possibly the frequent embracing that goes on between wing-forwards and opposing scrum-halfs? Maybe it's the satisfaction of knowing you have really fooled your man when he is sitting on your dislocated shoulder and not your buddy's. Of course there is the challenge the fullback feels as he calmly grins at the 15 charging foes knowing that even if he gets the kick off in time he'll be bunched by at least half of them.

Whatever the reason there are about 60 of these dedicated individuals who sacrifice four afternoons a week after intramurals to try and develop some quantity of finesse. Led by head coach LCdr. Jake Backkus, RN and assistants Lt. Jerry Purcell, ARN and Maj. John Jolley, USMC the team has managed to create a fairly respect-



able reputation up and down the coast during the last three years. By taking second last year in the NCAA finals the team has sparked some interest in many of the major East Coast clubs which has and will enable them to set up tougher and more diversified schedules.

So for this season the team has compiled a 14-3-1 record in regular playing. In the recent Tri-Service Academies Tournament, Navy's "A" side took a clean sweep over Army and Air Force while the "B's" dropped one to Army's "A" but gained revenge by a come-frombehind victory over their "B" side.

There are only two more home games left in the season but they are among the toughest. May 5 featured George Washington University and June 3 it will be the Chesapeake Rugby Club. So if you want to see a real *live* scrum (and live ones are rare) just slip out to the green fence sometime.

navy baseball roundup

Revenge! That is the name of the game for the Joe Duff-coached Navy baseball team. The weekend of May 4-6 was very harsh to the hopes of the Navy ball-players. An unearned run was the source of the winning run in a 2-1 loss to Army, which mathematically eliminated Navy from the slim possibility of a title in the Eastern Intercollegiate Baseball League. The weekend was further blemished when Cornell shell-shocked the Midshipmen representatives 14-1, and in the second game the Big Red took advantage of a bases loaded walk to sweep the double header 1-0. The Navy team is presently 7-10-2 overall with a 3-8-1 EIBL record and nine games remaining.

The roster of the baseball team shows only three seniors and much inexperience. The captain of the team, George Kerlek, has done his share to help the team in their endeavors for victory. His 3-0 record with thirty-six strikeouts and a 1.75 earned run average (ERA) leads the pitching staff. Steve Ogden has been a stable performer in right field with a .277 batting average, four home runs, and twelve runsbatted-in. Vince Nigro, the third senior, is the only experienced infielder from last year's team. When Vince came out of his slump and was wielding a hot bat and doing well in the field, fate struck. In the Baltimore University game Vince was struck by a pitch which resulted in a broken hand. That means a shuffle in the Navy lineup for the remainder of the year. The batting order for each Navy game is solidified by junior Evan Rasmussen (.297) and outfielder-converted-first baseman junior Jim Quinn (.250). The home team at Lawrence Field presents a very quick sophomore in Ed Firth at either shortstop or second base, and the other position is held by a hard-working scrapper in sophomore Mark Lawton. The catching corps has three fine receivers in juniors Gary Beheny, Joe Zeni, and sophomore Bob Riche. The dismal three-loss weekend held at least a hope of a bright future for the hard-hitting Zeni. He collected four of Navy's eight hits in the three games. Steady performers in Navy's outfield are juniors John (Tex) Teixiera and H. D. (Buck) Holtiwanger. On the bench, Coach Duff has a very capable right-handed pinch-hitter in junior Jerry Sobeck.

Along with Big George, the pitching staff seems to be performing well with a 2.63 ERA but has been hampered by the .215 hitting of the ball club. Juniors Lynn Champagne (1-2) and Bobby Becker (1-0) are mainstays on the staff. Pitching well with a 3.04 ERA but taking the hard knocks of defeat is sophomore Randy Young (0-4). The bull pen is bolstered by juniors Doug Rau and Roger Smith, sophomore Mark Baumgardner, and freshman Jim Garvey.

A conflict in rules between the EIBL and NCAA has caused a unique problem for Coach Joe Duff. According to NCAA regulations, freshmen are eligible for play, but the EIBL has set its play based on nonfreshman participation. That means that Coach Duff has a dual lineup system—one for league games and one for non-league games. After sixteen games, the statistics show that the separate lineups have possibly hurt the team in its quest for a league title and a subsequent NCAA bid. The three freshmen who regularly see non-league action are Jerry Liscomb (.353) at shortstop, Ron Clipp (.400) at third base, and Mark Haas (.273) in left field. The surprise of the pitching staff has been freshman Lou Repucci. He has had outstanding performances resulting in a 2-1 record, thirtytwo strikeouts, and a 0.36 ERA.

The week of 7 May through 12 May shows Navy with four games scheduled. The highlight will be the exhibition game against the Baltimore Orioles on 10 May and the use of the new scoreboard in center field. Navy has nine games remaining on its schedule with the final being the June Week game at Army. All is not lost for the Midshipmen if they can hit, run and pitch themselves to a winning record and a sweet victory over the "mule-tenders on the Hudson" on 2 June. Revenge!
