

"The Gatsby normally retails for \$60 and up, and the Sierra Elegant Beauties for \$70 and up. Your cost for one of these pens is just \$55 or \$65 respectively, plus shipping. Each pen is individually hand crafted, carries an unconditional lifetime warrantee for workmanship, and comes with a top of the line Parker-compatible refill and a protective felt sleeve.

Bob Leib, Bill Boniface and I have seen samples of John's work and can attest to its quality.

You can order your pen today at www.wellturnedpens.com. Click on the USNA Class of 1972 menu option at the top. In anticipation of our 50th Reunion celebration, John suggests engraving the pen with our class crest and the inscription, 50th REUNION 1972 - 2022.

Once John has your order and payment, his goal is to have your pen in the mail within two weeks.

However, note that he is a one-man operation (no mass production capability) and is already making pens for his classmates and their own 50th class reunion. With your order you should stipulate whether you would prefer blue or black ink and if the intended user of the pen is a right or left-handed writer.

Columbus and a parish advisory board member. He founded and was President of the Vintage Riders, a Honda 90 motorcycle gang of active adults who participated in local parades. He also enjoyed boating, sailing and snowmobiling. Jim's funeral service was held on 21 August in Newport WA; his family asks that memorial contributions be made in his name to St. Anthony's Parish of Newport, WA. The Class extends its deepest sympathies to Carrie and their family.

I have long said, "Irony and Physics make the world go 'round". I stand by that axiom today.

After months of very little information coming in from the class, I received a note from **Ken Pisel** (3rd Co.) regarding his company's upcoming 50th I-Day celebration (online, of course). He wanted to know how much space he could take up in this column doing a write-up on his 3rd Company mates. I told him that if he was covering the entire company, maybe we could do a "guest column" kind of thing and let him have the entire 2000 words we are allotted. After all. I had so little info to pass on (at that time, anyway).

Of course, as soon as we made the deal, I started getting info from many of you. Well, that will have to wait for the next issue, Ken has demonstrated a concept I have been espousing for 6 years: it only takes one guy per company to pull the entire group together, and stimulate routine and frequent communication between the entire company. And so, (with the cooperation of the *Shipmate* Staff, looking the other way that this intro takes us over 2000 words), here is Ken's 3rd Company update.

■ Greetings from **Ken Pisel**. It has been some years since I last wrote to *Shipmate*. I assumed the duties of class secretary (1981-1984) and wrote every month. I had not written prior to that or since, so I guess it's time.

I served 22+ years. After graduation I became a helicopter pilot (H-46) and after tours in HC-6 (3 times), Sicily, USNA, USS INCHON, and NAVEUR in London (our favorite), I had my final assignment: the Joint Forces Staff College. Knowing I was going to retire, I went back to school, earned a doctorate, and accidently created a job for myself at the college. I was there for over 27 years.

Andrea and I celebrated our 46th anniversary in June and settled in Virginia Beach. We have 3 kids and two grandkids.

In 2001 I was diagnosed with prostate cancer and have been playing that game ever since. After 5 clinical trials at Johns Hopkins, I achieved stage IV in 2016. Last year, my body informed me that it was no longer able to keep pace with travel at work, so I retired in January 2020. I made hunkering down an art form before it became popular.

On 29 June, I hosted a Zoom meeting celebrating the 50th anniversary of I-Day. We had 25 virtual participants from 3rd Company (the original Plebe 29th Company). Here is a breakout of who attended and a quick synopsis of the years gone by:

Bill Clark served 22 years as a SWO and had a tour at USNA teaching Thermo. After retirement, he worked another 27 years in civil service. In 2017, he retired for good. He and Susan live in Smithfield, VA.

Rick Mendenhall served 5 years as a submariner before getting out

to go back to school at Indiana University, where he earned a Master's and Doctorate. In 1985 he joined the faculty at Notre Dame for 33.5 years before retiring in 2018 and moving back to Franklin, IN.

Ken Huston flew P-3s for 5 years and then went on to put both Eastern and Northwest Airlines out of business before joining Delta. He is now retired and moved to Colorado to maximize his skiing.

Jack Hughes served with the Marines for 24 years alternating tours in the cockpit as an RF-4B RSO and tours with the grunts. Last tour was as Chief, EUCOM Airborne Command Post. After 5 years as a Quantico defense contractor, he finally retired and moved back to Denver, CO, where he tells us that, after 26 years, this was his last year working as a ski patroller. A number of guys noted that Jack is a great ski instructor.

Eric (Flash) Gordon was a SWO for 5 years and then worked with BellSouth in Louisville, KY, until he retired in 2013. He and Carolyn had been out cycling around the country; however, recent knee surgery has put a damper on that...for now.

Jim Boyer served for 27 years and flew the H-2 and H-60. He commanded HSL-47, and the ROTC unit at Rice University, his final tour. He then taught NJROTC in Spring, TX for 20 years and will soon retire. The Spring High School James C. Boyer NJROTC Building is named in his honor.

Mike Ryder (Salty Sam) served for 5 years as a surface nuke before moving into work with flight simulations. As PlayStation became popular, he started a company developing video games, ultimately working with Disney. He is in Seattle now and plans to retire at the end of the year.

Bob Thome is another P-3 pilot who went to the airlines. He stayed with Delta, retired from flying, and serves as an instructor. Poetically, he was up early on 30 June to see his next-door neighbor's son depart for I-Day at USNA (Class of 2024)... the circle is complete.

Don Patterson went from SWO to Aviator to SWO (something about trying to land a TS-2A
